HOW WEARING A FACE MASK OR FACE COVERING SLOWS THE SPREAD OF COVID-19


COVID-19 remains a threat in West Allis and we must take continued precautions to help prevent the spread.

In addition to frequent hand washing and physical distancing, **wearing a face covering in public settings** is an effective way to slow the spread of disease. Cloth face coverings help people who may have the virus and do not know it from transmitting it to others.

How does a face covering prevent the spread of COVID-19? COVID-19 spreads mainly from person to person through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs, sneezes, or talks. Cloth face coverings provide an **extra layer to help prevent the respiratory droplets from traveling in the air** and onto other people.

Who should not wear a face covering? According to the CDC, children under age 2, or anyone who has trouble breathing, is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the mask without assistance should not wear a face covering. If you are unable to wear a mask, consider alternatives like a *face shield* or staying away from public places where physical distancing is difficult (eg. grocery stores, pharmacies, restaurants/bars, family gatherings, etc.).

Milwaukee County has a *high COVID-19 activity level*. COVID-19 activity level is based on the **burden (case rate)** and the **trajectory (case change)** status.

In Milwaukee County the burden (case rate) is **high** and the trajectory is **shrinking**. However, any county listed as having a case rate of over 100 cases per 100,000 people in the last two weeks is still considered to have a high COVID-19 activity level. **Milwaukee County has a case rate of 170 COVID-19 cases per 100,000 people.**

The takeaway: As compared to other Wisconsin counties, Milwaukee County residents are still at high risk for contracting COVID-19. Additionally, wearing a face covering, practicing physical distancing, staying home when not feeling well, and avoiding public mass gatherings is advised when given the choice.
