December 13, 2018 Meeting

The next meeting of the Violence Free West Allis Collaborative (VFWAC) will be held on Thursday, December 13th. The meeting will be held in the Constitution Room of the West Allis Public Library, 7421 W. National Avenue, West Allis, WI. Hopefully the construction on National Avenue will be done and access will be easier. The meeting will begin promptly at 1:00 pm and last approximately two hours. At this meeting, we will review discussions on domestic violence from the October meeting, share the results of assault-related data for October and November, continue to discuss the Cardiff Model translation in the City of West Allis, and work on the development of an action plan for the project moving forward.

October Meeting Group Discussion Summary

At the October meeting we had a large group discussion on domestic violence in West Allis, current resources and services available and what gaps are there that we need to explore and work on. Below is a summary of the group discussion from October 12, 2018.

What resources and services are available?

- West Allis Health Department
- West Allis Police Department
- WAWM School District

Are there any gaps or needs to address in our Action Plan?

- Education
 - New JACCHO requirement to ask “Are you safe at home?”
 - Staff education and practice on how to ask the question and assure people don’t think it is referencing neighborhood safety.
 - Develop resource list and referral guidelines so they know what to do if people say no.
- Business involvement

- Workplace policy if an employee is not safe at home, what happens if it spills into the workplace
- How to respond if a customer asks for help
- Educational materials to increase awareness and resources available
- Schools
 - Making sure kids in these situations are safe in school and can get assistance
 - Add healthy relationships to health curriculum
 - Add dating violence to curriculum
 - Education materials to increase awareness of dating violence and resources.
- Employment/Financial Resources – many do not have the financial ability to leave.
- Housing/shelter
 - Shelter in/near West Allis
 - Policies that give housing priority to individuals that are leaving a domestic violence situation

Other thoughts

- Devote a small part of each agenda to learn about some innovative efforts to reduce violence
- Identified additional members to reach out to.

On September 30th we were notified that we were awarded a three year BJA grant to continue our work. In addition to the work on violence we will be pulling in additional data on substance abuse and analyzing to see the linkages with community violence.
